We also continue to support a strong Career and Technical Education (CTE) system. CTE has proven valuable for students pursuing the trades. Through CTE, students can earn dual credits for future education. In many cases, they can even earn a trade certification while still in high school, so they're ready to work the day they graduate.

Our dual-credit programs are expanding as well. These partnerships between local high schools and colleges or universities allow students to earn college credits early. Some even complete an associate degree before finishing high school. These credits transfer to any Idaho post-secondary institution, giving students flexibility if they want to pursue additional degrees.

Of course, even the best programs can never replace the lessons learned at home. As a father of four and grandfather of 16, I understand the energy, dedication, patience and persistence it takes to raise strong, grounded kids. Parents and grandparents, your role in your children's success cannot be overstated. You have taught them responsibility, resilience and character – and most importantly, the value of hard work. These values will guide them as they move into adulthood.
